## **Clowning in the Classroom**

Parades, Birthday parties, Company picnics, Church services, and special holiday functions. All great venues for clowning, but have you ever given thought to going into the classroom and "teaching" about a specific subject while in clown?

I happen to have the advantage of being a Visiting Instructor with Beloit College this year in their Psychology Department. (Ok, hold all the wise cracks and jokes about a clown in the **Psych Department for another** time.) Anyway, while developing the syllabus for the term, I happened to notice that there was a chapter on Stress. Now you may be thinking, what's funny about Stress and where does the "clowning" come in? Well, after getting an okay from the Head of the Psych Department, which is the third step (I'll come back to the rest of the steps), I took the time to develop a "program/lesson" built around the topic of stress, incorporating both the textbook and clowning skills. ### Earl "Orky" Temkin—Michiana Clowns






Earl "Orky the Clown" Temkin, age 81, passed away on Tuesday, March

26, at his home in Michigan City, Indiana. He and Lonna "Chips" Temkin, married for 57 years, have been faithful

members/attenders of the Midwest Clown Association for MANY years, serving in many different roles, and helping to host/plan several Round-Ups. Earl was also a faithful member of the World Clown Association, and served as President of WCA from





side of his alley, and especially loved encouraging Junior Joeys. He made such an impact on his community that the local cable ac-

cess channel (Channel 99) featured footage of him during two "News and Views" segments after his passing. Who can forget the last performance of Orky at a Round-Up, complete with pink tutu, acting out with the Michiana Clowns in 2017's "Looking for Work" Circus skit, where the alley took home the coveted Alley Skit 1st Place Trophy?

Earl was always seeking ways to make people smile and laugh. Upon his passing, his wife Lonna

passed on information to fellow alley members regarding the funeral and cable programming, requesting that they show up to pay their respects in full clown. She ended by saying, "Let's spread laughter, not tears. Orky wants it that way!" A clear tribute to the kind of life lived by the man many of us called friend: Earl "Orky" Temkin.



### Let's Paint the Midwest.....RED!!

"If by chance some day you're not feeling well and you should remember some silly thing I've said or done and it brings back a smile to your face or a chuckle to your heart, then my purpose as your clown has been fulfilled." - Red Skelton

This quote by Red Skelton is one of my favorites! We, as clowns, do our best to help others smile! Red Skelton has long been remembered as "one of America's clowns." Red was on television in the 1950s, 60s & 70s. Since then, an entire generation has grown up and never saw him perform. He created some of the most memorable characters on Television. No one will ever forget his Freddie the Freeloader tramp character! ....or WILL they!? Thankfully, his films live on, and episodes of his TV show are available on DVD. But, generally, only people who remember him would pursue finding those mediums.

So how do you keep his type of good clean comedy alive? How do you endear one of the funniest, most talented men in America to people young and old? Answer: *A MUSEUM and Festival* to honor his legacy in comedy! That is just what the Red Skelton Museum Foundation has done!

For those who may not know, "Red" Skelton was born Richard Bernard Skelton on July 18, 1913 in Vincennes, Indiana. THAT'S RIGHT!! Red Skelton was a MID-WEST BOY! The Red Skelton Museum Foundation opened the Red Skelton Museum of American

Comedy in 2013 on the 100th anniversary of his birth and added a festival and parade to commemorate the legacy of this truly funny man. With the benevolence of Red's wife Lothian, the museum wants to share their favorite son's funny legacy with the rest of the world. The festival is always the weekend nearest his birthday.

Ok, that's great, BUT what does that have to do with CLOWNS!?!? Well, that is the point of my article. RED grew up LOVING the circus and CLOWNS!! In fact. Red's father, who passed away before Red was born, was a CLOWN on the Hagenbeck-Wallace Circus. Red had such an affinity for clowns, he became an entertainer and started working on medicine shows around the age of 10. He also LOVED CLOWNS so much he painted them on canvas as a hobby. Eventually, his ex-wife convinced him to display his clown art at a Las Vegas show. The art was so popular, his clown paintings and



lithographs became a revenue stream for Red.

Another monument to his influence on comedy is the Red Skelton Performing Arts Center, constructed by Vincennes University in Vincennes, IN. Each year around his birthday in July, the Museum hosts a parade and festival to honor Red's Legacy. During the short-lived Red Skelton

Clown School, the parade had been billed as the "parade of a thousand clowns." Unfortunately, the clown school is no longer in existence, but they still have the parade and festival. Although, sadly, the number of participating clowns has dwindled.

The last few years, a hand full of clowns from the Midwest Clown Association and I have participated in the parade and festival. Being a part of the parade is a volunteer opportunity.

With other events as part of the festival, it is more of a destination type of parade-go for the parade,

room is also provided for the clowns to cool off. If you participate in the parade, you can even relive those college days and live in a dorm for one night free (there is a nominal fee for an additional night). And since you share the dorm and a room with other clowns...you never know when a balloon jam may

break out.

Saturday is parade and festival day. There are various events in the morning, with the parade being highlight around 11:00 a.m. Followthe parade,



there is a small stage where you can perform anything you wish (-given that it is clean and appropriate for all ages, since that is the way Red performed...clean

wholesome material.) There is always a donut eating contest (an homage to one of Red's classic routines) and a bathtub race, which is funny even without clowns; but a clown team is always a highlight with the crowd.

In 2017, "to bring awareness to a performer that represents Red Skelton's humor," the Museum started presenting the "America's Clown" Award to recognize other **American** clowns. In fact, Dick Van Dyke and Carol Burnett were the first two recipients. The last few years, Red's widow, Lothian, has also been in attendance.

sell you on the idea of being a part of this charming festival. well... I AM. This little town gave birth to one of the funniest clean comedians in the world. And since he is widely regarded

environment. In fact, one student, at the end of the program stated, "If all my classes were this fun, I'd probably make the Dean's list."

That being said, it goes without saying that there are hundreds of topics that could be presented in the classroom by a clown, which would be funny, yet educational in nature. And if you think about it, a lot of serious topics (bullying, stress, health topics, etc.) would lend themselves to some great opportunities for a clown, or two, to work up and present in a way that would grab your selected audience's attention, just by virtue of the novelty of having a clown teaching about the topic and having students learn about it in a fun manner.

So how does one go about doing this? Step One: Obviously, you need to come up with a topic of interest. Step Two: Select who your audience might be...grade school, middle school, high school, and yes, even college students. Step Three: Approach the person who is in charge (the principal, teacher, curriculum program developer, etc.) and let them know what you have in mind. Remember, you have to "sell" the idea. Step Four: Once you get the okay, design the program with your specific target audience in mind. This might mean tweaking your program if you use it for different groups. It might also mean changing your "normal" clown character. In this case, it allowed me to develop a new character,

"Professor Luther Von Fritzeneric." Step Five: As with anything, PRACTICE and refine the "program" (show). Finally, Step Six: Get feedback! This will allow you to decide if it is worth pursuing and doing again and/or perhaps give you ideas for other "programs."

This is just another way to introduce people to the "art of clowning" and step outside the traditional way people view clowns. Just think about this for a moment. Your child comes home from school and says, "Some clown came to my class today and taught us all about friendship." Your knee-jerk reaction might be, "that's no way to talk about your teachers!" On the other hand...what a unique educational experience for that child.

as one of America's clowns and given his love of clowns: it is compelling that a clown with a little availability might at least consider supporting his legacy and the museum. In the opening quote of this article, Red identified himself as a clown, and moreover, set a standard for which all clowns should strive...bringing a smile to your face or a chuckle.
